## **The Sentence**



Look at each group of words given below.

1. The children are playing with a ball.





3. The birds flew away.



Each group of words says something. It says what is shown in the picture.

Each group of words has a meaning and makes complete sense.

A group of words that makes complete sense is called a sentence.

## Read the group of words given below.

'The rises the east in Sun.'



The above group of words does not make any sense. It is meaningless. So it is not a sentence.

Now let's rearrange these words in proper order to make a sentence. 'The Sun rises in the east.'

We see that when words are placed in proper order, they make sense and become a sentence.



- 1. A sentence must be a group of words placed in proper order so that it makes complete sense.
- 2. A sentence must begin with a capital letter.
- 3. A sentence must end with a full stop (.) or a question mark (?) or an exclamation mark (!).

### A sentence can be long or short

A sentence may have as many or as few words as required, to make complete sense. A sentence can even be of one word, provided it conveys complete sense. Suppose, I want you to come. I shall say, "Come". This is just a one word sentence. You will know what I mean. Here, "come" makes complete sense.

Though the word 'you' is not mentioned, you know that the sentence is meant for you.




