

Two Parts of a Sentence

Look at the two sentences.



1. Sita sings.



2. Stars shine.

Divide each sentence into two parts:

- 1. Sita // sings.
- 2. Stars // shine.

The first part of the sentence says about 'what' or about 'whom' the sentence is. This first part is called the subject of a sentence. It names a person or a thing.

In the above sentences, Sita and stars are the subjects.

The second part of each sentence says something about the subject. In sentence I, it says something about Sita. What does it say? It says that Sita sings.

In sentence 2, it says something about **stars**. What does it say? It says that the stars **shine**. 'Sings' and 'shine' are **predicates**.

- 1. The person or thing spoken about is called the subject of a sentence.
- 2. The part which talks about the subject is called the predicate of a sentence.

A subject can be a word (as in the above example) or a group of words. Similarly, a predicate can be a word (as in the above example) or a group of words.

The following sentences have been divided into two parts: subject and predicate.

Subject	Predicate
I. Ravi and Karim	go for a walk each morning.
2. This hungry child	is weeping bitterly.
3. The little lamb	followed her everywhere.
4. An old beggar	will be walking along a narrow lane.

The verbs have been given in red in each of the predicates. The verb can be one word or two or more words (go, is weeping, will be walking).

In the sentences that express command, order or request, the subject you is mostly not mentioned but understood, as in the following:

- I. Come here.
- 2. Please, give me your book.

They mean:

- I. (You) come here.
- 2. (You) please give me your book.
