## I. Answer these questions in a few words or a couple of sentences each :

Q.1. How old are Margie and Tommy?

Ans. Margie is an eleven year old girl. Tommy is a thirteen year old boy.

# Answer each of these questions in two or three paragraphs (100-150 words): Q. 1. What are the main features of the mechanical teachers and the school-rooms

that Margie and Tommy have in the story?

Individual students learned their lessons from these teachers that had a black computer or television screen, which flashed with instructions and questions. So, the schools today are definitely much more enjoyable.
